Heads' Roundtable | 3:00-5:00 pm

This workshop will explore strategies for effective school trusteeship. Participants will review standards of good practice for boards, clarify roles and responsibilities, and share ideas for working in partnership with administrators to provide strategic leadership for the school. Case study discussions will foster creative engagement, explore application of good governance principles, and address common board challenges.

Keynote 7:15 pm

Leading Education in a Time of Conflict and Polarization – Being Part of the Solution Dr. Katy Anthes

K-12 education, along with other important public policy issues, is in a challenging place in our history given the polarized and often high conflict environment we find ourselves in. Sometimes it seems that intense ideologies, "us vs them" mentalities, and anger are the main driver of our education-related discussions and lead us down paths that don't focus on productive middle ground nor help us support students. Yet, we can make progress toward changing this environment by building our "good conflict" muscles — muscles that allow us to be curious, disagree, problem solve, bring forth new ideas and develop a deeper respect and understanding from where others are coming. By modeling this, we will be cultivating people, organizations, and partners who are focused on getting our educational approaches and collective decision-making skills back on track.

6 Governing through Conflict: Key Lessons from the Past and Present

KATY ANTHES, PHD

Dr. Katy Anthes is the creator and director of the FORWARD initiative at the <u>Public Education</u> and <u>Business Coalition (PEBC)</u> as well as a founder and partner of The Third Mile Group, a social policy consulting firm. The FORWARD

Initiative – from polarization to progress – prepares leaders in public policy to prevent and manage political polarization in their communities and workplaces. Formerly, Anthes was the Commissioner of Education in Colorado from 2016-2023, and is widely respected for her commitment to listen to diverse perspectives and develop solutions that are founded on productive middle ground. As Commissioner, Anthes worked with the Colorado State Board of Education, the Legislature and the Governor to craft and implement a vision of education for Colorado. She led the Colorado Department of Education, a \$10 billion dollar agency, dedicated to helping districts achieve great things for students. During her time as Commissioner, she served on the Council of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO) Board of Directors and the Education Commission of the States (ECS), Steering Committee, Dr. Anthes was with CDE since 2011, serving as chief of staff, interim associate commissioner for achievement and strategy and executive director of educator effectiveness.



DR. MANYA WHITAKER

Dr. Manya Whitaker is the Interim President at <u>Colorado College</u> and Professor of Education. She is a developmental educational psychologist with expertise in identity formation and motivation. Her research examines the development

and sustainment of teachers' diversity-related self-constructions within urban schools. Her courses such as Diversity & Equity in Education, Teacher and Teacher Identities, and Educational Psychology inform, and are informed by her research. Her research has generated multiple publications including <u>Schooling Multicultural</u> <u>Teachers: A Guide for Program Assessment and Professional</u> <u>Development, Learning from the Inside-Out: Child Development and</u> <u>School Choice and Counternarratives from Women of Color Academics</u>. Her most recent book, <u>Public School Equity: Educational Leadership</u> <u>for Justice</u>, capitalizes on her consulting with K-12 organizations.
